J. Peter Burgess is a philosopher, political scientist and cultural historian. He is currently Research Professor at the Peace Research Institute Oslo (PRIO) and Senior Researcher at the Institute for European Studies of the Vrije Universiteit Brussels. He is Editor of *Security Dialogue*, an international scholarly journal dedicated to innovation in security research, and Series Editor of the Routledge/PRIO *New Security Studies* collection. His research and writing concern the meeting place between culture and politics in particular in Europe, focusing most recently on the theory and ethics of security and insecurity. He has published 11 books and over 65 articles in the fields of philosophy, political science, gender studies, cultural history, security studies and cultural theory. He has developed and directed a range of collaborative research projects with Norwegian and European partners. He has contributed to the development of research policy as a consultant to the European Commission, and collaborated in the elaboration of public policy in Norway, France, and Poland.
